stories of trauma. Trauma has a significant impact not only on human development, our minds, our bodies, and our relational capacities, but on our faith development and spirituality too. Our understanding of God and church, and how we understand Scripture can get inextricably tangled up in our experience of the world and how it's shaped us. Preaching has the power to help or hinder those who are healing from trauma and it's important to recognise the responsibilities we have as we shape our message each week, whether in our own churches or as a visiting speaker.

- Understanding the impact of trauma on our human development and spirituality
- Investigating how trauma impacts communication between a speaker and listener
- Navigating theological difficulties from the pulpit with a trauma-informed approach
